A conversation keeps going when each turn gives the other person something to do with it. A question hands the turn straight over; a related comment or a detail of your own leaves a door open. It stops when a turn closes the door - a one-word answer, or a jump to something new with no bridge.

What to expect: Neurodivergent and neurotypical people often converse differently, and different is not worse. Talking at length about something you love is a way of sharing it. Parallel play is company. Scripts and repeated phrases are real communication. A child who does these things is not failing at conversation. What is genuinely useful to teach is the second set of moves - asking something back, following the other person's topic for a turn - so a child can switch into them when the situation calls for it and switch out when it does not. The aim is a child with two options, not a child who sounds like somebody else.

Ask a Question Back

Ask a Question Back

1. For example: What is wrong with him? Have you taken him to the vet? Is he getting better?
